Edna O'Brien







Irish novelist memoirist, playwright, poet and short-story writer Edna O'Brien was born on 15 December 1930 in Tuamgraney, County Clare, Ireland.


She was educated at the Convent of Mercy in Loughrea, County Galway, and at the Pharmaceutical College of Ireland. She married the writer Ernest Gébler (later separated) and moved to London in 1959. where she had two sons.

Her first novel, *The Country Girls* (1960), the first book in a trilogy of novels (with *The Lonely Girl* in 1962 and *Girls in Their Married Bliss* in 1964) about two young convent-educated Irish girls who rebel against their upbringing and run away to Dublin and London. Her frank treatment of sexuality in these and subsequent novels brought her into conflict with the Catholic Church, and these and several other novels were banned by the Irish Censorship Board.

She has written eighteen novels, eight plays, eight short story collections, eight nonfiction books, four books for children and one collection of poetry and won numerous international awards.











Roisin Meaney





It won a Write a Bestseller competition and was published in 2004. Four years and three books later she packed in her teaching job to become a full-time writer. Her books consistently make the Irish top ten bestseller list. She is the author of three children's books, and once a month she tells stories to toddlers in her local library. She divides her time between Limerick city and West Clare, drinking too much tea in both places. She is a fan of cats, spotty bananas and random acts of kindness.







Donal Ryan





Donal Ryan was born outside Nenagh, Tipperary, in 1976. He holds a degree in law from the University of Limerick where he now lectures in Creative Writing. He worked for the National Employment Rights Authority until April 2014. He is married and lives in Castletroy, County Limerick, with his wife and two children.

He has published six novels and one short story collection. In 2016, novelist and playwright Sebastian Barry described Ryan in *The Guardian* newspaper as "the king of the new wave of Irish writers".

All of his novels have been number one bestsellers in Ireland.

She is the maker of a number of radio documentaries, funded by the Broadcasting Authority of Ireland (BAI).

She has also availed of the Simon Cumbers Media Fund to report on development issues supported by Irish Aid in Haiti.

Fiona won a Justice Media Award for a short radio series on the work of Bedford Row Project, which supports prisoners and families in the mid-west.

More recently she was the recipient of the 2021 Excellence in Teaching and Learning Award at NUI, Galway where she is a lecturer in Broadcast journalism.


But
